


Based on a true story.

## **June 2024**




Erik Christian Haugaard's Hakon of Rogen's Saga is a remarkable novel that perfectly catches the mood of a harsh but heroic people. Set at the end of the Viking period, it tells of a young boy, Hakon, from the island of Rogen who, after his chieftain father is murdered, undertakes to reclaim his birthright from his treacherous uncle. The illustrations by renowned artists Leo and Diane Dillon make this captivating story come alive.

A Slave's Tale, the sequel to Hakon of Rogen's Saga, is told from the point of view of a slave girl, Helga,

who stows away on the longship when Hakon, the young Viking chieftain, sets sail for France on a voyage to return Rark, a freed slave, to his homeland.

Erik Christian Haugaard was born in Frederiksberg, Denmark. He was the son of Professor Gottfred and Karen (Pedersen) Haugaard. He came to the United States in 1940 after fleeing the Nazi invasion of Denmark, and served in the Royal Canadian Air Force before the end of World War II. He attended Black Mountain College in North Carolina from 1941 to 1942. He also attended the New School for Social Research in New York City.



In 1963, he published his first book for children and young adults, Hakon of Rogen's Saga. The book was well received by readers and critics and was named an American Library Association Notable Book. His literary awards include recognition for his 1978 translation of The Complete Fairy Tales and Stories of Hans Christian Andersen. Haugaard married Myrna Seld in 1949 and together they had two children. They later lived in Denmark and Ireland. He died at Ballydehob in County Cork, Ireland.

## **Book Review** by Luella Grangaard



Children of Ash and Elm by Neil Price. This is an excellent history of the Vikings. At times a slow read but a nice take on the history of the Viking world from an unbiased eye.

The Viking world also has the story of how the gods created man and woman. Two pieces of drift wood were found on the beach by Odin and his brothers Vili and Ve'. They shaped the wood into the man "Askr", the ash tree and the woman "Embla", the elm. This is the Norse,

Adam and Eve story.

Another term that came out in the book I found very interesting was the concept of "hydrachy". This term refers to someone or something exerting power over others utilizing ships or the sea. There were no central leaders, just those who owned or captained the ships. Along the coast of Norway there were small areas that were controlled by different groups utilizing the sea.

There was a very interesting chapter, "The Golden Age of the Sheep Farmer". The sails for Viking ships were made of wool coated with grease, tallow or fish oil. Textile archeologists have figured that it would take for a medium sized ship a sail of 80 square meters, two-person years of 10 hour days just too make one main sail and a reserve sail would be needed, so that is another 2 years. These were woven in strips and sewn together. Archeologists have also figured by the early 1100 hundreds it would take for the ships used just in Denmark, in one year it would require the wool of two million sheep.

And on page 487 there is a fantastic statement in regard to the landing and contact with the native people of North American. "this also marked something else: the unique moment in history when the populations that had begun expanding out of Africa thousands of years earlier finally linked up from east and west, completing the full circle of settlement and encounter around the globe."

Stockfish is unsalted fish, especially cod, dried by cold air and wind on wooden racks on the foreshore. The drying of food is the world's oldest known preservation method, and dried fish has a storage life of several years. The method is cheap and effective in suitable climates; the work can be done by the fisherman and family, and the resulting product is easily transported to market.

In Norway and Iceland, the stockfish is mostly used as a snack and for lutefisk production.

#### **Racism and Minorities**

Throughout most of the 19th century, many people spoke of a Norwegian "tribe", a "nation", a "people". In the interwar period, "race" had become a common term - but it also came under sharp criticism.

There were different views on which people constituted a separate race. In 1910, Statistics Norway operated with Swedes and Danes in Norway as separate races, in addition to Norwegians, Sámi and Kven. In other contexts, the Norwegians were considered part of a "Nordic race".

#### Race theory as science

The idea that there were natural, separate races drew strength from the prestige of biological science. It had had several scientific breakthroughs, from bacteriology to heredity. Moreover, racial theories provided a convenient explanation for, for example, differences in living standards between groups - they were innate.

Ranking of breeds

From the assertion of differences, the path was short to ranking: the races were arranged in a hierarchy, almost always with the "white" or "Nordic" or "Norwegian race" at the top and others as less valuable. And should such "inferior" really be treated in the same way as others?

#### Roma and Jews

Both the immigration policy and the measures towards minorities aimed at an imagined nation-building. If the nation was made as unified as possible, it would also be strong, many believed.

The idea of race played a role in immigration and refugee policy. Two groups in particular were tried to be kept out: Roma and Jews. Roma (Gypsies) were not mentioned directly when the first real immigration law was passed in 1915, but in 1927 it was clearly stated in the law that they were to be refused entry.

Jews were only reluctantly allowed in and accepted into society. For what were called "Russian trading Jews", 20 years' residence was the minimum to be able to obtain Norwegian citizenship,

for Germans the limit was eight years, for Norwegian-Americans two years.

When Jewish refugees from Germany and German-occupied countries arrived after Hitler came to power in 1933, the supposed negative characteristics of the Jews were one of the reasons why most of them were rejected.

#### Room

While Romani had roots in Denmark-Norway back from the 16th century, Roma, often called Gypsies by the majority population, had arrived between 1860 and 1888. They probably belonged to the group called Koelderari who had fled from Hungary and Romania in the 1860s. Several were born in Norway from the 1890s, and several acquired Norwegian citizenship and passports. But the Ministry of Justice believed that this had happened on the wrong premises and refused from 1924 to recognize the validity of the passports.

#### Sami

Racial thinking also governed policy towards the minorities in the country. The Sami indigenous people were considered by many to be weak and doomed to doom in the face of the advance of the superior civilization that the Norwegians represented.

"Only we, the superior, the stronger, must take care [...] to show gentleness and kindness", said professor of ethnology Yngvar Nielsen in 1914. The state's policy was to lead to the disintegration of the ethnic group as a collective, among other things by promote a heavy-handed linguistic assimilation. Sami children were forbidden to use their mother tongue at school.

#### Quener

The Kvens, the fine-skinned people in the north, were not an indigenous people, but a minority that had come to Finnmark and Troms in the 18th and 19th centuries. The women were seen as hardy and skilled - but precisely for this reason they were also considered a competitor who could become the dominant ethnic group in the north. There were also nationalist currents in Finland, and the Norwegian authorities feared that the Kvens would allow themselves to be enlisted in a political program for a Greater Finland that

would include northernmost Norway.

Therefore, the authorities sought to promote assimilation by, for example, introducing military service from 1897, at a Norwegian folk high school in Pasvik or free subscriptions to Norwegian weekly newspapers. Attempts were also made to shield the Kven from contact with Finland, among other things by not building roads that crossed the border.

#### **Taters**

The itinerant Romani people, so-called Taters, were also a historically immigrant minority, who had also absorbed people from the villages they passed through. While in the early 19th century they could be considered useful contributors providing services to the farming population (such as castrating horses), later in the 19th century they were increasingly seen as a social problem.

#### **Forest Finns**

The Forest Finns came from Savolax in Finland, and settled on both the Swedish and Norwegian sides in the forest areas along the border. In Norway, the first came in the 1620s and 1630s. In Finnskogen they maintained a culture linked to language, music and legends for a long time. Also the distinctive agricultural technique that swedje farming constituted, a special building custom, sauna bathing and food dishes testified that the Forest Finns were a separate ethnic group. In 1999 the Forest Finns were recognized by the Storting as one of the historic national minorities in Norway.

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## **Gustav Vigeland**

Gustav Vigeland (1869 -1943), born as Adolf Gustav Thorsen, was a Norwegian sculptor. Gustav Vigeland occupies a special position among Norwegian sculptors, both in the power of his creative imagination and in his productivity. He is most associated with the Vigeland installation (Vigelandsanlegget) in Frogner Park, Oslo. He was also the designer of the Nobel Peace Prize medal.

Adolf Gustav Thorsen was born to a family of craftsmen, just outside Halse og Harkmark, a former municipality in Mandal. His parents were Elesæus, a cabinetmaker and Anne Aanensdatter. He had three brothers, of whom Emanuel Vigeland (originally Thorsen) became a noted artist. As a youth, he was sent to Oslo where he learned wood carving at a local school. However, the sudden death of his father compelled him to move back to Mandal to help his family. Gustav lived for a time with his grandparents on a farm called Mjunebrokka in Vigeland, an old farm in Valle parish.

He returned to Oslo in 1888, this time determined to become a professional sculptor. He came to the attention of sculptor Brynjulf Bergslien, who supported him and gave him practical training. The following year he exhibited his first work, Hagar and Ishmael. In his 20s, he adopted the new family name Vigeland, from the area he had briefly lived.

Vigeland spent the years 1891 to 1896 in several voyages abroad, including Copenhagen, Paris, Berlin and Florence. In the French capital he frequented Auguste Rodin's workshop, while in Italy he experimented with ancient and Renaissance artworks. In these years the themes that would later dominate his inspiration - death and the relationship between man and woman-first appeared. He held his first personal exhibitions in Norway in 1894 and 1896, which received notable critical praise.

Until 1902 Vigeland was engaged in the restoration of the Nidaros Cathedral in Trondheim. The contact with Mediaeval art contributed to another frequent theme in Vigeland's art, the dragon as symbol of sin but also as a nature force, fighting against man.

## Famous Norwegian



Back in Oslo, he obtained from the town an abandoned studio in which to work. In 1905 Norway became independent from Sweden. Vigeland, considered the most talented Norwegian sculptor, received numerous commissions for statues and busts celebrating renowned compatriots like Henrik Ibsen and Niels Henrik Abel.

In 1906 Vigeland proposed a chalk model for a monumental fountain. Initially, the idea of the Oslo municipality was to put the fountain in Eidsvolls plass, the square in front of the Parliament of Norway. His work was generally welcomed, but the location created a dispute: completion of the work was postponed by the dispute. Gustav Vigeland is most widely known for the Vigeland installation, a permanent sculpture installation in Frogner Park in Oslo.

In 1921 the City of Oslo decided to demolish the house where Vigeland lived and build a library. After a long dispute, Vigeland was granted a new building from the city where he could work and live; in exchange, he promised to donate to the city all his subsequent

works, including sculptures, drawings, engravings and models.

Vigeland moved to his new studio on Nobels gate in the borough of Frogner during 1924. His studio was located in the vicinity of Frogner Park, which he had chosen as the definitive location for his fountain. Over the following twenty years, Vigeland was devoted to the project of an open exhibition of his works, which later turned into what is known as Vigeland Sculpture Arrangement (Vigelandsanlegget) in Frogner Park. The Vigeland installation features 212 bronze and granite sculptures all designed by Gustav Vigeland. The sculptures culminate in the famous Monolith (Monolitten), with its 121 figures struggling to reach the top of the sculpture.

#### Legacy

Some art critics considered Vigeland's sculptures to be expressions of nazi or fascist aesthetics, and he has been compared to Arno Breker. Writing in Verdens Gang, a newspaper started by former Norwegian resistance members shortly after the German occupation of Norway ended in 1945, Pola Gauguin wrote that the Vigeland installation "reeks of Nazi mentality." The

of Nazi mentality." The works in the installation depict individuals variously possessed: In agony and shock; Rapture and torture, from birth to death and beyond. The assessment of Strømodden finds no political themes.

## Norwegian Food

#### Homemade fish balls

Fish balls in white sauce are a well-known and beloved classic that never goes out of style. Making fish balls from scratch is not as difficult as you might have thought and turns out extra good. Here we give you a simple recipe for this popular family dinner.



#### Fish balls

600 g white fish fillet, without skin and bones 1/2 tsp salt
1 tbsp corn starch
1 egg
1 1/2 cup whole milk
ground pepper, preferably white

#### White sauce

2 oz wheat flour 2 oz butter 2 cups milk salt pepper grated nutmeg

This is what you do

#### Make the fish balls

Make sure all the ingredients stay at the same temperature. The easiest way to do this is to put everything in the fridge for at least an hour before you make the fish balls.

Process the fish and salt quickly in a food processor.

Stir in corn starch and eggs. Mix with the milk, first with 1 cup. Add some ground pepper.

Test cook to see if it has the consistency and taste you want. If it is too firm, you can add a little more milk. Put in more salt and pepper if needed.

Boil a large pot of lightly salted water. Turn down the heat so the water is just below the boiling point. Dip a spoon into cold water and form small balls that you drop into the water. Leave the fish balls to soak for 5-10 minutes until they are firm.

Lift out the fish balls and place on a plate.

#### Make white sauce:

Heat the milk in a saucepan.

Melt the butter in another saucepan over low heat. Add the flour and stir this together well, to a smooth and fine consistency.

Sprinkle the mixture with warm milk, while constantly whisking. When you have added all the milk and there are no more lumps in the sauce, bring the sauce to a boil.

Season with salt, pepper and grated nutmeg. Let the sauce simmer for approx. 10 minutes to remove some of the "raw taste" from the flour.

Put the fish balls in the white sauce and leave to soak for 5 minutes.

Serve with boiled potatoes and carrots. If you want curry sauce, add 1 tablespoon of curry to the white sauce.
